Achieving and *Growing*



As we mark the end of first semester and the midway point of the 2023-2024 school year, we take time to celebrate BSSD's accomplishments.

Our continued mission is to provide the best educational opportunities for all our students. As

we grow academically and as a community, we also update and upgrade current BSSD buildings to provide students with the best educational opportunities.

We again have an opportunity to continue that growth with a no tax rate increase bond issue on the February 6, 2024 ballot.



This bond issue includes:

◆ The current Career Innovation Center (formerly the Blue Springs Freshman Campus) building dates back to 1954. The building has been added onto or renovated eight times in the last 69 years and will be razed to provide a new state-of-the-art facility with functional spaces for Real World Learning programming like Health Sciences, Physical Therapy, Business, Gaming Technology, Microsoft Technology, Aviation, Culinary Arts, and Hospitality, to name a few. The building will also include a restaurant for the hospitality and tourism programs and an additional gymnasium for multi-purpose and athletic use.

◆ All four BSSD middle schools would receive a multi-purpose addition geared for fine arts that would be reinforced to withstand an EF-5 tornado.

◆ James Walker Elementary, Franklin Smith Elementary, and William Yates Elementary will receive office renovations and additions to accommodate additional counselors, mental health professionals, literacy coaches, assistant principals, interventionists, and other support staff.

◆ William Yates Elementary has reached capacity. Additional classrooms are necessary.

◆ Franklin Smith Elementary received an extensive remodel and addition in the 2021 no tax rate increase bond issue. The school still needs new windows and exterior.

◆ BSSD Superintendent Dr. Jerome and the BSSD Board of Education are committed to a second phase of the projects. Another bond issue will need to take place in the years to come to address the infrastructure at Thomas Ultican Elementary and a second phase of the Career Innovation Center. SOARING HIGH

JAGUARS AIR FORCE JUNIOR ROTC RAIDER TEAM A TWO-TIME NATIONAL CHAMPION



The Blue Springs South High School Air Force Junior ROTC program is building a legacy of national proportions. For the second straight year, the Jaguars took home a national championship from the Annual All-Service Raider National Championships in Georgia.

The Jaguars are back-to-back national champions in the Air Force division, which brings together more than 1,400 cadets and

instructors from across the country. Last year, BSSHS won the mixed division. This year they took first place overall in the male division with a squad that included eight returning students led by Cadet Colonel Anthony Lorek and Cadet Lieutenant Colonel Zach Koso.

The Jaguars' male team placed first among Air Force teams in the 4K mountain run and gauntlet, and second in one rope bridge, cross country rescue and physical team

test. Among 29 all-service JROTC programs (Army, Navy, Air Force, and Marine schools), the Jaguars finished sixth overall nationally in both the male and mixed divisions.

Senior Zach Koso was a member of both national championship teams, and a cadet leader this year. He said the key to success is hard work, but most of all functioning as a team.

"It has been an honor to have commanded this season's Raider

team alongside my best friend Anthony, but the credit goes to the team - without their work, dedication, and trust this season would not have been possible. JROTC goes deeper than just a class - it is a family filled with my best friends that I know will be with me through life.”

Senior Anthony Lorek was also a member of both championship teams, and this year’s leader. He said the entire season has been one to remember.

“It wasn’t just Raider Nationals that was great. It began back in August when we started practice and we bonded with our teammates. I have built new and close relationships with teammates this year because of how close we were as a team. JROTC has been a second home throughout high school, and has given me leadership opportunities, lifelong relationships, and has guided me to what I want to do in life.”

The Raider team and BSSHS AFJROTC program is led by Colonel Stan Cole and Senior Master Sergeant Courtney Jones. The BSSHS AFJROTC program received an “exceeds standards” rating during its Head Quarters AFJROTC Unit Evaluation after going through all aspects of the program – uniform inspections, curriculum, finance, logistics, health and wellness, drill, instructor certifications, and more. This is the highest rating a unit may receive.

JAGUAR, WILDCAT BANDS PERFORM TOGETHER FOR FIRST TIME IN 20 YEARS

Both the Blue Springs High School Golden Regiment and Blue Springs South High School Jaguar Pride marching bands had historic 2023 seasons. But in the midst of all the performances and competitions, the most memorable event of the year might be the one that included popsicles – and a historic combined performance.

Last spring, the Golden Regiment had scheduled an exhibition performance at the Kansas City Championships held at Blue Springs South High School. That idea grew when Jaguar Pride Director Kenny Hansen and Golden Regiment Director Dr. Tim Allshouse talked about a joint performance at that competition – a chance to bring the bands together for the camaraderie and musicality benefit.

The song “September” by Earth, Wind and Fire was chosen and each band worked on the

music separately, gearing up for the combined effort. Unfortunately, rain washed out the Kansas City Championships, and the performance was canceled – until the next week.

With a 30-minute joint rehearsal on the day of the event finished by handing out popsicles, the Jaguar Pride and Golden Regiment readied to perform together at the Golden Regiment Invitational. In the evening, after all the visiting bands had competed, the two bands played together for the first time since the 2002 homecoming game, for a combined Jaguar and Wildcat crowd.

“Often musicians can feel isolated in their own schools because it is a unique pathway,” Tim Allshouse said. “Jaguar Pride Director Kenny Hansen and I enjoyed putting the bands together not only for the great music, but for the connections the students could have across town with other teenagers that are doing the same



activity. We truly are one community. We are South's biggest supporters, and they are ours. It is so fun to share our love of band with each other and the community."

Hansen said the real winners were those in attendance. "This was a great win for all the students, staff, and community to once again join together."

Golden Regiment tuba player Oliver Kellermeyer added, "It was really fun to make music with other tuba players and to meet other kids from Blue Springs that are as passionate about band as we are."

Jaguar Pride percussion captain Genely Gordon added, "It made my senior season a lot more enjoyable getting to play alongside new and old friends. I am thankful to both directors for giving us the opportunity to have fun playing alongside

each other and reminding us that music is fun and doesn't have to be competitive all of the time."

The National Champion Golden Regiment Marching Band finished first place at the Grand National Bands of America Championships in the AAA division and fourth overall. The GR was the only non-AAAA team to make finals and swept the AAA caption awards, including Outstanding General Effect, Outstanding Visual, and Outstanding Music. The ensemble competed rigorously during the competition to take home this prestigious ranking after taking first place at the St. Louis BOA Super Regional Championship two weekends prior.

The Jaguar Pride ended its impressive season by earning Grand Champion at the Bentonville Marching Invitational, first place at the GR Invitational (Class C), and fourth place, their best-ever finish, at the Renegade Review (Tulsa, OK).

50 YEARS IN EDUCATION



James Lewis Elementary marked its place in BSSD history this fall, celebrating its 50th anniversary. The school celebrated the occasion with a schoolwide assembly during the day and a public open house in the evening. There were 50th year t-shirts, performances of both school songs by the Supercat Singers choir, and a proclamation from Blue Springs Mayor Carson Ross declaring November 2, 2023, as “James Lewis Elementary Day.”

Current and former JLE staff members gathered

for the evening celebration. Former BSSD Superintendent Dr. Charles McGraw spoke to visitors about what JLE was like in 1973, when he served as the school’s first principal. Current Principal Devin Ceperley discussed the changes to the school over the years, including the new entrance and playground provided by the 2021 no tax increase bond issue.

Former principals Pat Crowe and Lori Reynolds also attended.



PERFECT PAIRING

The BSSD has two students who have scored a perfect 1520 on the annual Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying test (PSAT). Blue Springs High School junior Natalie Colbert and Blue Springs South High School junior Vincent Medina each registered perfect scores.

The PSAT helps students prepare for the SAT by testing math, reading, and writing skills. High-scoring

students can earn national recognition, including a National Merit Scholarship. The average score on the PSAT nationwide is 920.

Vincent is a member of the BSSHHS orchestra, jazz band and swim team. Natalie is a member of the Wildcats soccer and tennis teams.

Continued Excellence

Several BSSD sports teams had outstanding seasons this fall. The Blue Springs South High School Jaguars softball team took second place in Missouri Class 5, falling to Francis Howell. The Jaguars continued a storied run that has included three state titles in the past six years and two second-place

finishes. The Jaguars finished the year 27-3.

The Blue Springs South girls country team placed second overall at the Missouri Class 5 State Meet for their seventh trophy in a row and eighth trophy in the past 10 years. BSSHHS Girls Cross Country finished with three All-State

runners – Emma Allen in eighth place, Ella Rew in 10th and Ashlyn Wahrenbrock in 22nd.

The Blue Springs High School Wildcats girls cross country team finished third overall. All-State runners were Abbey Brackenbury in fifth, Paige Stuart in 19th and Faith Fotiades in 28th.

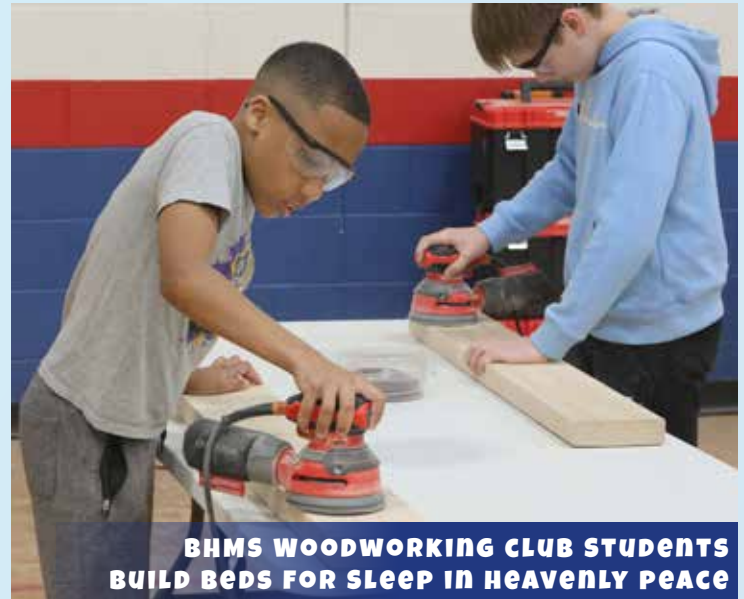

We want our students to earn the right to celebrate their success or be disappointed if they fail. Growth happens when a person thinks they are at their limit and then go a little bit farther.

Personal growth also happens when students experience new and enlightening things. There are clubs and activities at every building in the district that aim to shift students' paradigm or expand their worldview. The James Walker Elementary Farm to Table club was recently highlighted at the November BSSD Board of Education Meeting. The club takes

food from seed to meal and supports families in need through the food they produce. Through participating in this activity, students can have an impact on their community through their actions.

At Brittany Hill Middle School, there are many activities that help students demonstrate personal growth. The Unity in Action club has the mission of "making a change in yourself can help make a change in someone else." They have taken the lead on creating a culture of understanding, educating their peers during Native American Heritage Month, and leading class presentations on coming together through our differences. We also have a woodworking club, where students engage in projects that aim to uplift and beautify our community.

Throughout the BSSD, students and staff have a long tradition of giving and caring for our community – especially those families in need. Each year, our schools organize fundraising drives. The funds are used to shop for items that can bring comfort to families who might otherwise struggle during the holidays.

At Daniel Young Elementary, students in the Kindness Club sold candy canes during their lunch period, raising enough funds to purchase items for two families.

Amellia Purcell, a student at Valley View High School, wanted to help Hope House, a local domestic violence shelter, so she and fellow students designed posters and hosted a item donation at the school. Amellia remembered when her grandmother donated to Hope House, and wanted to honor her by collecting clothes, toys, household items and health products this holiday season.

Blue Springs South High School's Adopt-a-Family drive is a true schoolwide and community effort. Groups and clubs throughout the school chip in by shopping for gifts and wrapping them. This year, BSSHS adopted 36 families, totaling 169 people. The list of helping hands include: DECA, HOSA, National Honor Society, Technology Student Association (TSA), and the Jags' football, baseball, volleyball, girls and boys swimming and diving, girls and boys basketball, and cheerleading teams. Community leaders also help sponsor the effort – including Kennedy's Jewelers, Scooter's, Fogel-Anderson Construction and Beta Gamma Sorority.

BSSD SPELLING BEE GOES RECORD 46 ROUNDS



The 2023 BSSD Spelling Bee reached record territory, with participants competing through 46 rounds - the longest District Bee in BSSD history. Eighth grade student Garrett Fry of Delta Woods Middle School won the overall title by outlasting fourth grader Caleb Co of James Walker Elementary.

Garrett became only the second Blue Springs School District student to advance to the semifinals of the Scripps National Spelling Bee in Washington, D.C. last year, reaching the final 56. Caleb was competing in his first BSSD Spelling Bee. Caleb misspelled "Pleiades" in the 45th round, and Garrett won in the 46th by correctly spelling "tetrizzini." Dani Agate, a seventh grade student

at Moreland Ridge Middle School, finished third overall.

Each BSSD building spelling bee winner now advances to the Mid-Continent Public Library's Online Semifinal Spelling Bee from February 7-14, 2024.

A Community of **CULTURE**

A new club at Blue Springs High School not only celebrates Asian culture, but is also building a community of students interested in sharing each individual's heritage and background.

The Asian Cultural Exploration (ACE) Club began last year when current club President and junior Raymond Vo felt a need to create a space to celebrate and educate his and other students' cultures. The club created a Wildcat TV video for Asian American and Pacific Islander Heritage month for the first time in BSHS school history, has visited multicultural fairs at elementary schools, partnered with the US at BSHS diversity club, and presented at staff meetings in multiple schools.

"ACE club allows me to share my culture with many other Wildcats, and to build an inclusive community that connects through Asian culture," Vo said. "Without

ACE, I would've never met so many people that have the same experiences and background as me. It has made me proud of my heritage and legacy that will be left at school after I graduate."

The ACE Club recently presented to Franklin Smith Elementary's Journey Around the World Club. The club participated in FSE's first Multicultural Night last year and third grade teacher Rani Khakh liked their messaging.

"I am so impressed with the students," Khakh said. "Their presentations were informative and engaging. Most of all, my students learned so much about the cultures presented which will create a better understanding and acceptance of people who have different cultural backgrounds and heritage from them."

FSE third grade student Dylan Peyton learned a lot through the ACE Club visit. "The presentation was so cool," he said. "I learned

that in Vietnam the color red means good luck. I learned the Hawaiian dance and that it is a way of communicating and telling a story. I can't wait to learn more."

Wildcat student Angela Castro Sanchez said ACE Club is about sharing multiple cultures and stories. "ACE is one of the most educational and fun clubs I've been involved in. Something very beautiful within the club is that every member is different in their unique background, getting together to learn about Asian culture. Also, you appreciate every person with a leadership role, from the president to the event planner, and the media team. They worked so hard to form the club it is today and what it can be in the future."

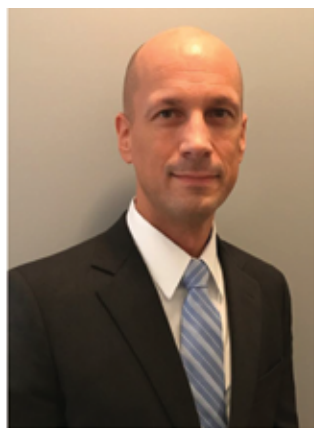
